# Excerpts from the MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS **POPE FRANCIS** for the CELEBRATION of the **53rd WORLD DAY OF PEACE** - 1 JANUARY 2020

# PEACE AS A JOURNEY OF HOPE: DIALOGUE, RECONCILIATION AND ECOLOGICAL CONVERSION

Peace is a great and precious value, the object of our hope and the aspiration of the entire human family. Hope is thus the virtue that inspires us and keeps us moving forward, even when obstacles seem insurmountable. The terrible trials of internal and international conflicts, have an enduring effect on the body and soul of humanity. Every war is a form of fratricide that destroys the human family's innate vocation to brotherhood. Mistrust and fear weaken relationships and increase the risk of violence, creating a vicious circle that can never lead to a relationship of peace.

How do we break the unhealthy mentality of threats and fear? How do we break the current dynamic of distrust? We need to pursue a genuine fraternity based on our common origin from God and exercised in dialogue and mutual trust. The desire for peace lies deep within the human heart, and we should not resign ourselves to seeking anything less than this.

The world does not need empty words but peacemakers who are open to a dialogue that rejects exclusion or manipulation. Peace "must be built up continually"; it is a journey made together in constant pursuit of the common good, truthfulness and respect for law. Listening to one another can lead to mutual understanding and esteem, and even to seeing in an enemy the face of a brother or sister.

In our Christian experience, we constantly remember Christ, who gave his life to reconcile us to one another (cf. *Rom* 5:6-11). This path of reconciliation is a summons to discover in the depths of our heart the power of forgiveness and the capacity to acknowledge one another as brothers and sisters. When we learn to live in forgiveness, we grow in our capacity to become men and women of peace.

This journey of reconciliation also calls for listening and contemplation of the world that God has given us as a gift to make our common home. We need to become more open to encountering others and accepting the gift of creation, which reflects the beauty and wisdom of its Creator. This conversion must be a transformation of how we relate to our sisters and brothers, to other living beings, to creation in all its rich variety and to the Creator who is the origin and source of all life. It requires that "the effects of our encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in our relationship with the world around us"

# PARISH FAIRTRADE STALL:

As the Fairtrade shop in Bury St. Edmunds is no longer able to supply goods for other stalls on a 'sale or return' basis, and we are not in a position to purchase goods directly from 'Traidcraft', reluctantly we have had to discontinue our monthly Parish Fairtrade stalls.

However, please continue to support our Fairtrade producers by looking out for the Fairtrade Mark whenever you shop, and buy items carrying this mark as often as you can.

# **FAIRTRADE CHALLENGE:**

To encourage us to look out for and purchase items with the Fairtrade Mark when we are shopping, the parish Justice & Peace group has issued a challenge to see who can collect the most Fairtrade Marks when shopping between now and the 4th Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday) - 22nd March 2020. You can collect as a family, in a team or as individuals. Collection forms are available in the narthex and extra ones can be found, when you need them, in a folder on the J&P noticeboard. Completed forms can also be left on the J&P noticeboard. The Fairtrade Marks collected must be original - not copied and can be from any Fairtrade product - tea, coffee, sugar, chocolate, wine, T-shirt etc.

Whoever collects most 'Fairtrade Marks' by the closing date will receive a Fairtrade Easter Egg... so get looking, shopping and collecting...
